Fire Hazards Tragedy Note At Halloween

"Along with the gaiety and festivity of the Halloween celebration lurks the danger of fire," Battalion Chief Paul Schneider, Los Angeles County Fire Department, cautions.

Fire service officials request that the following safety measures be taken to prevent children from suffering painful burns and possible loss of life.

1. Do not use highly flammable materials for Halloween costumes.
2. Parents are warned to be cautious about face masks which are highly flammable.
3. Use only decorative materials, crepe paper, etc., which are flameproofed.
4. Be exceptionally careful with candles in Jack-o-Lanterns.
5. Provide ample adult supervision for all student activities.

Bankers Get FBI Tips on Holdup Moves

Federal Bureau of Investigation representatives listed hold-up precautions to more than 350 bank personnel from six Southwest financial institutions and 13 communities in a two-hour seminar last week.

FBI agents, under the leadership of Henry Onsgard, assistant special agent in charge of the Los Angeles FBI office, dramatized holdup situations to emphasize methods of dealing with criminals who attempt bank robberies and the increasingly more effective methods of apprehending such individuals.

Craig Edwards of the Hawthorne branch of the Bank of America served as chairman of the bank's organizing committee for the meeting with Pacific State Bank and Citizens National Bank acting as co-sponsors.

Bankers represented were from Hawthorne, Lawndale, Lennox, Inglewood, Torrance, Gardena, Hermosa, Manhattan and Redondo Beach, El Segundo, Culver City, Long Beach, and San Pedro.
