On Faulkner's often difficult prose style: "Some English professors and scholars try to dig through Bill's unpunctuated sentences a word at a time. They were never intended to be read like that. Read them as you would any other piece of writing and you will find they are just like thoughts that go through your own mind. They start off with an idea that brings on another idea that brings on another..."

John recalls that when Bill received word he had won the Nobel Prize he was about written out. "He had said years ago that if that happened, he'd turn to writing mystery stories." After the prize, Faulkner began writing again, and in those years turned out some of his major work, "A Fable," "The Mansion," "The Town," "The Reivers."

Bill kept very little of the Nobel Prize money for himself. John reveals that a great part of it was set up as a fund for the needy in Fayette county.

Former professor of Latin American Civilization at Pomona College and Claremont Graduate School, Herring has a background of more than 25 years of research and writing on Latin American countries.

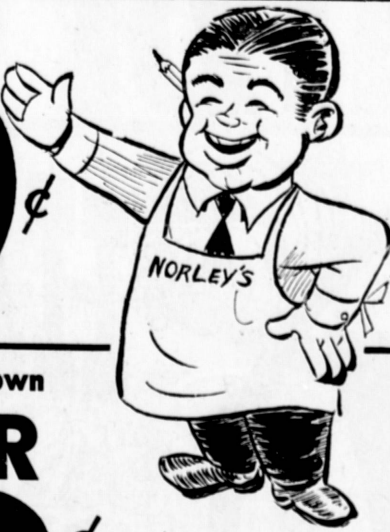
