

During this emergency, in addition to their regular duties, our manage-ment personnel will take their turns at the switchboards, clearing trouble, install-ing phones, and doing the many other jobs that are necessary to keep a telephone company going. Even though they may not be as proficient as our regular service personnel, they are desirous and determined to continue good telephone service for our customers. We ask that you understand the situation and bear with us.

In our months of negotiations for a new contract with the union, we have been guided by our responsibility and obligations to (1) provide a high quality of service at a reasonable cost to our customers; (2) pay a fair return on the money which our shareowners have invested; (3) provide good working conditions for our employees, and fair compensation for the work they perform; and (4) continue to provide good telephone service without the necessity of seeking an increase in telephone rates. one rates.

It is our earnest hope that the union soon will recognize its responsibility to customers and shareowners, as well as to our employees, and accept the fair r we have made in settlement of its demands.
