Mumps Not a 'Nuisance **Disease' Warns Doctor**

Mumps is a contagious dis-ease that is most often seen in children between the ages of and 15, though not infrequent-ly adults and younger children are involved as well. While not as infectious as some of the other childhood diseases such as measles and chickenpox, nonetheless some 2,536 cases of mumps have been reported in Los Angeles County so far this year as against 2,300 for the same period in 1962.

Although generally benign, mumps should never be con-sidered only a "nuisance dis-ease," because the illness some-times causes serious complica-tions, particularly after puber-ty. nost cases.

The cause of mumps is a specific virus, known as the "mumps virus," that gains en-try into the body of a suscept-ible person by way of the up-per respiratory tract. The chief source of infection is virus.
