

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

Mrs. Mar-garet Collin, a consultant who is in charge of the Spanish program, says this technique is just the same as children use to learn English. "First you hear then you speak, then read, and finally write," says Mrs. Collin.

day when the state law takes effect, 91 of the district's ele-mentary teachers are enrolled mentary teachers are en

in a course given by the UCLA University Extension. Teachers in the course experience the same exposure to Spanish that their students will experience. By the end of the semester, the 91 teachers will be ready to begin instruction in all to begin instruction in all seventh grade classes in the

The University Extension class is given each week by two native speakers—Mrs. Alba Moesser and Mrs. Gladys Kennedy, both Spanish teach-ers at Torrance High School. The two instructors are also working with Mrs. Collin to prepare a teaching guide. More than 800 students are now taking the Spanish course.

More than 800 students are now taking the Spanish course. The total includes 300 in the pilot program at Casimir, and some 500 in Calle Mayor, Rivi-era, Parkway, and Crenshaw Schools. Students are first taught to speak Spanish by listening to recordings and tapes. Once they begin to speak teachers take up essen-tials of grammar, and as the class progresses, st u d ents learn to read and write.

THE INITIAL program at Casimir School was begun on a voluntary basis. Mrs. Collin re-ports that no one has asked to be exempted from the pro-gram. In fact, she says, stu-dents can't seem to get enough. Comprehension is t ested periodically through tests comprehension is tested periodically through tests given by teachers. The tests, used now in most schools where Spanish is given, were developed by the California Test Bureau with the help of the Torrance schools.

Test Bureau with the help of the Torrance schools. Students receive an average of 20 minutes of instruction each day. Some schools, where seventh and eighth grades are departmentalized have a teach-er who may teach only Span-ish. Others take their Spanish lesson as part of the regular class day.




