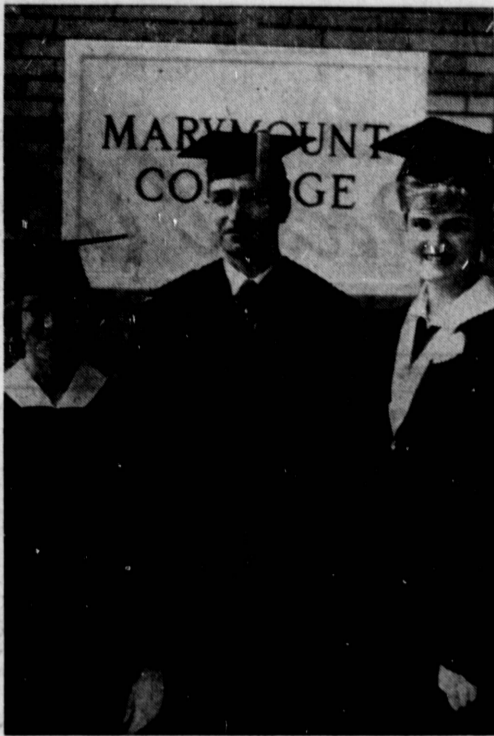
Drill team of district 1 will put on the initiation under the direction of Doris Beatty. Eight persons from Torrance and other councils will be initiated.
