Chace Urges Voters to Check Status

Resident of Los Angeles County should double check to determine if they are legally registered to vote in coming elections, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Many persons may have been voided their chance to vote through non-use or by changing residence, the supervisor said, pointing out that registration of voters is now in progress.

There are six classes of persons who should register or re-register to protect their voting franchise. They are:

1. Those who have changed their address since previous registration.
2. Those who have changed their names since last registration.
3. Those who desire to change their political affiliation.
4. Those who failed to vote at the General Election in 1962, and have not since re-registered.
5. Those who have become of age, and have not registered.
6. New residents of the county, who have required qualification by date of election. (Including one year residence in State, 90 days in county, 21 years of age, etc.)

Persons may register with deputy registrars at many places throughout the county, Chace said.

Veterans who have lost their discharge papers may replace them by writing to the Military Personnel Records Center, General Services Administration, 9700 Page Blvd., St. Louis, Missouri, using form DD-1108, which may be obtained from the Los Angeles County Service Office.

Montessori School Names Mrs. Rowe Administrator

Escuela de Montessori, 1101 Camino Real, Redondo Beach, where children work with the binomial theorem and read newspapers by age 6, has appointed Mrs. Qudisia Rowe from India as the new administrator. Mrs. Rowe has had a long-

standing association with the Montessori method of teaching, starting at the age of 4 in the first Montessori school to be opened in India by her mother. This school was under the direct supervision and instruction of Dr. Montessori, founder of the schools.

DR. MONTESSORI conducted many teacher training courses at the school in India during the period 1939-1944, and Mrs. Rowe on many occasions received training direct from the school's founder.

After completing the senior work at Cambridge in England, Mrs. Rowe took formal Montessori teacher training in New Delhi under an official representative of the Association of Montessori International.

She subsequently taught in her mother's school, and in 1957 began a study of Montessori schools in Rome, Paris, London, and Amsterdam.

SHE COMPLETED her studies in school administration in Boston in 1961 where she received a master's degree in education.

During her college years, Mrs. Rowe conducted a summer Montessori school at Dunbarton College in Washington, D.C., and helped initiate the now famous Whitby School in Greenwich, Conn.

A large number of children have been enrolled in the Montessori school in Redondo Beach, school officials report.
