





A long-time Torrance resident traveled to San Jose Friday to seek additional information about the Feb. 22nd death of her son, who was killed in an airplane crash near Half Moon Bay south of San Francisco. Mrs. Evelyn Marasco, 1632 Arlington Ave., told The HERALD she was

making the trip to seek infor-mation about the accident which was fatal to her son, Roy, 36-year-old engineer for a San Jose ordanance plant. Bodies of the victims have not been located. been located.

Witnesses said one passenger was seen swimming away from the plane but he disappeared shortly. A Coast Guard search for the plane and the two vicfor the plane and the two vic-tims was unsuccessful.
