

This Experience, Important Lesson

Dear Ann Lànders: My hus-band's father is nearly 70. We moved into his rather large home three years ago when my mother-in-law died.

Several months ago he suffered a stroke. His recovery has been very good and he now has the use of all his faculties. The only thing which is troublesome is that his right side is partially para-lyzed and it is difficult for him to eat properly. He spills food on the tablecloth, on himself, and sometimes on the floor.

Our children are 7, 9, and Our children are 7, 9, and 10 and we are trying to teach them good table manners. When they see their grandfa-ther slopping all over, it's a problem to make them toe the mark.

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I have suggested that we feed Grandpa in his room. My husband won't hear of it. Mealtime should be a pleas-ant family affair and it can't be pleasant with the old man at the table. I hope you will agree with me because my husband and I have been arguing about it for weeks and I need help.—BATTLE FA-TIGUE.

TIGUE. Dear Battle: Grandpa should not be isolated from the family. It would be cruel to feed him in his room. More important than a clean tablecloth and metacu-lous manners is compassion and understanding for people who are old and sick. Explain to your children why grand-pa spills things. Encourage them to help him and to be kind and considerate.

This experience could be an important lesson for your children and help them to be better human beings.

Dear Ann Landers: Why is fit that some people think just because you live next door to a family you know their every move and are perfectly willing to act as messenger boy, check-room attendant, or anything they want.

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It happened again today. A woman banged on my neighbor's door for 10 min-utes. It sounded like a herd of elephants. Then she came over and handed me a pack-age. She didn't ask me, she told me to give the package to my neighbor.




