I, too had a brother who was a problem to the whole family. He wouldn't stay in school and he kept getting into trouble. When I married, my husband and I became his legal guardians and he made his home with us. I got him to see a psychiatrist and he made remarkable progress.

After a year he was vastly improved. My mother then insisted that we let her have him back. He didn't want to go but the family pressure was so heavy we gave in.

It was a horrible mistake for which I will be everlatingly ashamed. My brother is now a total loss to the human race, and I am responsible. How I wish I had stood my
