Harvey Sales In Long Beach Up, Aluminum

Net sales for Harvey alumi-num for the six months ending March 31, rose to \$38,427,159 from \$38,025,033 for the corre-sponding months a year earlier, Lawrence A. Harvey, president, remorted reported.

Net income for the period was \$2,889,843 or 50 cents a share as compared with \$3,372,786 or 59 cents a share for the like period of 1962. The lower earnings were attributed to the general drop in alumi-num prices

num prices. "Progress has been made," Harvey said, "in the company's efforts to find new applications for aluminum products as well as for items fabricated from titanium, zirconium, steel al-loys, and other special metals. loys, and other special metals. Operations at the company's new fabricating plant in Adrian, Mich., are steadily ex-panding, and construction of an aluminum plant in the Virgin Islands is well under way. Final plans are being drawn up for the company's rolling mill in the Ohio Valley."
