des Peninsula as an alternate choice.

TORRANCE officials indicated yesterday, however, that they would not permit the college to go to the Peninsula site without new efforts to have the Torrance site reconsidered.

"The Fox Hills rejection is marvelous news," Mayor Albert Isen said. "It offers us a new chance to put new material before the trustees outlining the improvements we have been able to acquire in relation to the Torrance site." When all the facts are in, the college should come to Torrance, he said.

ASSEMBLYMAN Charles E. Chapel (R-46) who has been an outspoken opponent of the Fox Hills proposal, hailed Friday's announcement, but said the June 5 meeting, while the next step, may not be the final action.

He told THE HERALD that people should continue to make their feelings known to the board of trustees at 2930 W. Imperial Hwy., Inglewood.

"The fight must be continued with the board until final action is taken," Chapel said.
