



decision on location of the South Bay State College could be announced.

Following a flying trip to Sacramento Friday to discuss Sacramento Friday to discuss the college site and other matters with Governor Brown and members of the Legislature, Mayor Albert Isen reported that high-level Sacramento officials are "now aware of the community sentiment which favors Torrance for the college

ISEN CONFERRED with Governor Brown twice during the one-day trip to the capital, and said the governor now had been brought up to date on the entire college situation.

Elsewhere in Sacramento, Isen said he heard favorable comment on Torrance's bid for the college site—but was told the initial decision had to come from the Board of Trustees for State Colleges. The state's finance department has right of review over the decision be-cause of the expenditures of state fnuds.

"THERE IS NO question but that we are the decided choice of the entire area to get the college," Mayor Isen said. "Practically all of the cities and civic groups in Torrance and the Southwest have en-dorsed the Torrance site," he added. added.

Endorsement of the Torrance site this week by the County Board of Supervisors also was listed by Mayor Isen as a big boost for the local site.
