

# Torrance Wins National Pedestrian Safety Award

Torrance has earned a special citation for significant improvement in pedestrian program activities in the American Automobile Assn.'s 24th annual national pedestrian safety program, it was announced by the Automobile Club of Southern California.

Cities and states participating in the program are judged on the excellence of their pedestrian accident records and their pedestrian safety programs carried out in 1962. They are grouped into

categories according to population.

**THE SPECIAL** citation made to Torrance is granted to cities which have shown significant improvement in pedestrian program activities during the past year. Torrance was the recipient of a special citation in last year's AAA program.

The award was one of 113 made in recognition of a city's efforts to save pedestrian lives in traffic. Eight other southern California cities earned awards in various categories. A total

of 1,650 U.S. cities submitted reports to the AAA for scoring and analysis.

**THE STATE** of California won a special citation for outstanding pedestrian program activities among the 40 states submitting reports. Seven cities in northern and central California also earned recognition for their achievements in protecting the man afoot.

The other eight southern cities winning honors in their respective categories are: Ventura, honorable mention

award; it also leads the nation in pedestrian program activities; Escondido, achievement award for no pedestrian fatalities for 11 years; Santa Ana, special citation for outstanding program activities; Huntington Beach and San Clemente, special citations for significant improvement in pedestrian program activities; and Santa Maria, La Puente and Brea, citations for no pedestrian fatalities during the year.

In announcing the winners, the Automobile Club of Southern California reported that since 1937, when the AAA pedestrian program was launched, pedestrian fatalities in the United States have dropped from 15,000 to 7,900 last year, representing a reduction of 49 per cent. During the same period deaths from all other types of traffic accidents have increased 37 per cent.

Commenting on the awards, Robert J. Chaney, manager of the Auto Club's Public Safety Department, saluted the local school officials, traffic engi-

neers and police of the winning cities for their efforts in the program.
