

Small Sports Car Explodes Into Flames

> A young Hermosa Beach man burned to death early Thursday morning after his small foreign sports car burst into flame in a collision at Artesia Boulevard and Prairie Avenue. Killed in the accident was Ronald Clifton Grubb, 21. Taken into custody by police was Laverne Grover Selt, 35, of Los Angeles, driver of the other car.

Grubb's red sports car, which he had purchased only a few days before the accident, Was engulfed in flames with Grubb sitting behind the wheel when police arrived upon the scene.

OFFICIALS of a Torrance mortuary removed his body from the charred wreckage. Five police units converged upon the scene and traffic control was necessary for about an hour after the accident which occurred about 12:30 a.m.

Belt was taken to a hospital for a blood alcohol test and then to the police station for booking on charges of suspi-cion of felony drunk driving and manslaughter. He suffered minor cut on bis lin which a minor cut on his lip which did not require medical treat-


