This year is the hundredth anniversary of the publication of Professor Jerry Thomas' infamous book on the cocktail.

Stick with me. You may not end up wearing sables, but you sure are going to be kept abreast of facts like the foregoing.

The Prof. did not invent the cocktail, but more than any single human he was responsible for the flowering of this worm within the rose of our culture.

When Americans lost their taste for proper booze, we began to go down the drain. Hopefully, there are signs that unloused-up spirits are coming back. Albeit over Prof. Thomas' dead body.

The Prof. was former principal bartender at the Metropolitan Hotel in New York, the Planter's House in St. Louis, and the Occidental Hotel and El Dorado Saloon in San Francisco. He did stints in New Orleans and the mining camps of California.

He was the most famous bartender in America, but he knew nothing about the pleasures of alcohol. As Don Juan almost certainly knew nothing about the pleasures of love.

His frightening treatise was called "The Bon Vivant's Companion, or How to Mix Drinks," It followed the very odd idea that good whiskey, rum, and gin were not good enough—they had to be gussied up with sugar, cherries, eggs, quince juice, cointreau, peaches, coriander seeds, and tansy. And Lord knows what else.

He did to booze what the epicene hairdresses of our time do to the beauty of women, most of whom now look as if they are wearing something to conceal a brain tumor.

His punch jelly, made with dissolved isinglass and other things, rendered "many persons, particularly of the softer sex, somewhat unfitted for waltzing and quadrilling after supper."

And there was his famed Fish-house Punch-mix equal quantities of brandy, peach brandy and Jamaica rum, and to a pint of mixture add a lemonade made of two and a half pints of water, half a pint of lemon juice and three-quarters of a pound of sugar.

"Generally sufficient for one person," wrote the

The Prof. picked up some of his nastier lore during two sojourns in California. Including the composition of the martini, which ruined gin utterly.

This blot on the escutcheon of San Francisco was originally called the Martinez, presumably in honor of the Bay Area town of the same name. It must have been invented by a particularly vengeful barkeep.

The Prof.'s original formula, which eventually (in attenuated form) invaded just about every businessman's lunch in the country: one dash of bitters, two dashes of maraschino, one pony of Old Tom gin, one wineglass of vermouth, two small lumps of ice. "If the guest prefers it very sweet add two dashes of gum

What has happened to the Prof.'s martini is a good, if rare, example of the native horse sense of the American male prevailing over the idiocies put out by authorities.

Gradually, and to the consternation of the finest bartending minds in the Nation, the martini has been refined from a potpourri of garbage into what the Lord intended it to be in the first place: a straight drink of ice-cold gin.

From Yaleie to dishwasher, the magic word in ordering a martini for the past two decades has been "dry". Translated: "Get the detritus out of this drink and gimme some gin."

The best martini I know (and widely applauded as such) is put out by an owner who fills his vermouth bottle with water, and puts VERY SMALL quantities of this in his so-called gin cocktail.

And there's the story my friend, George the Bartender, tells, "Make it drier," said the customer. For months he said it every day. George finally left out the vermouth altogether.

'Make it drier," the intonation continued. Until one day the customer caught George making it with

"I told him I'd been making it that way for a month," reports George. "And he's still sore."
