## **City Issues** \$6 Million In Permits

Building permits with a record valuation of nearly \$6.4 million were issued in Tor-rance during May, city officials reported this week. More than 350 new dwelling units will be constructed in the city under the permits issued.

Largest of the 269 permits issued were taken out by J. H. Barton Construction Co. The permit was for construction of 41 homes valued at \$1,003,005. Other large permits included a \$600,000 medical building. a \$346,000 apartment house, and a \$675,000 apartment house.

Smith Brothers Fish Shanty also was issued a permit for extensive remodeling and additions to the restaurant and offices.

Thirty permits calling for construction of 82 single-fam-ily residences and 20 permits for construction of multiple unit dwellings were issued.
