The Torrance Area Youth Band has received an official invitation to perform at the New York World's Fair in the summer of 1964. According to James Van Dyck, director of the Youth Band, the date of the band's performance is set for Aug. 7, 1964, and is part of the cultural program being sponsored by the New York World's Fair Corp.

The band received the invitation after submitting recordings, programs of past public concerts, and recommendations from two leading music critics from universities in the Los Angeles area.

The band will go to New York around Aug. 1, 1964, and spend two weeks there and in Washington, D. C. Besides playing at the World's Fair, it also will give a concert at the Walter Damrosch Band Shell in the Lincoln Center, the world's newest and largest cultural center. While in Washington, D. C., the band hopes to be able to take part in the President's "Con-certs for Youths" on the White House lawn.

The band will fly on jet airliner from Los Angeles to New York and return. Band members will pay their own transportation and the youth band organization will furnish food and lodging for the two-weeks jaunt. The trip is being planned as a combined cultural, musical, and educational experience for the local young musicians, Van Dyck said.

Proposed Tax Hike Cut to 11.4 Cents

Supervisors recently slashed \$12.7 million from the prelim-inary county budget to cut in half the proposed tax hike dur-ing a marathon budget session. The cuts will reduce the pro-posed tax hike to 11.4 cents per \$100 assessed valuation. The tax rate for 1963.64 is expected to be \$2.1960 per \$100, compared with the cur-rent \$2.0818. After the budget hearing, Supervisor Burton W. Chace said he was "satisfied that we have a fairly realistic budget." Following the hearing, super-visors ordered the auditor \$882,876,823 for adoption. The budget became efective July 1. YMCCA Sets

Major capital projects clip-ped from the budget include a new mechanical building in downtown Los Angeles, an East Los Angeles sheriff's sur-st at i o n, an administrative building at the Wayside Honor Farm, and acquisition of land for Otterbein Park.

SEVERAL SMALL expenditures were also chopped from the 1963-64 budget. Supervisor Kenneth Hahn protested several other ex-penditures which he said were "unnecessary to support with taxpayers' money." These in-cluded such items as \$15,000 for the International Beauty Congress, exhibits at the Na-tional Orange Show, World Trade Week, and the Downey Art Museum.
