\$266,997 In Taxes Paid Here

Torrance residents benefited from \$266,997 in 1962 ad valorem and other taxes paid by Southern California Gas Co., the utility reports.

Education received the largest sum, a total of \$114,279, with the City of Torrance obtaining \$86,994, according to G. M. Babbe, manager of the firm's Southwest Division which headquarters in Inglewood.

Torrance's allocation is part of nearly \$13.5 million which went to Los Angeles County's cities, schools, special districts and for use by the county, Babbe pointed out. He noted that education received \$5,298,374 of the gas company's payment.

Southern California Gas Co. spent \$43 million in all taxes last year. Nearly one-half of the amount was paid to support Southland communities and counties, Babbe concluded.

THIS IS especially true since Chairman Luckman was quoted authoritatively—despite subsequent denials—that the college was going on the Peninsula or nowhere.

Concensus of Torrance college boosters apparently boils down to the recognition that a Peninsula site — while inconvenient for nearly all of the future student body — is much better than the "Fox Hills rabbit, pulled by slick fingers from a magician's hat."

Trustees will meet in the State Building in Los Angeles on Thursday and Friday. "If they go ahead and select the Palos Verdes site and we think it is still a poor choice, we won't give up the fight," Mayor Albert Isen said this week.

MR. FINDLEY was active in the founding of Torrance Memorial Hospital and served it for more than a quarter of a century as a director and secretary to the board. He assisted Mrs. Jared Sidney Torrance, widow of the city's founder, with selection of the hospital site and with its early development.

Mr. Findley was president and founder of Remco, Real Estate Management Co., which is the successor to the Dominguez Land Co. set up by Mr. Torrance.

He was active as a member of the Torrance Rotary Club and in the Masonic fraternity. He was a life member of Torrance Memorial Hospital Assn.

Mr. Findley, who never married, is survived by a brother, Norman Findley Sr. of Brooklyn; a sister, Lucretia Findley, Brooklyn; a niece, Mrs. Harry Meislahn, Albany, N.Y.; and a nephew, Norman Findley Jr., Garden City, N.Y.

Private interment has been arranged in Forest Lawn, Glendale.

ECC and Austrian Teacher Trade Posts

Mrs. Florence Merzlak, of El Camino College, and Dr. Berta Steffelbauer, of Linz, Austria, will transfer duties through a Fulbright Exchange during the coming year.

Primary objective of the exchange program is to strengthen understanding of the culture and educational system of host countries to the advantage of teachers and students.

Dr. Steffelbauer, who will teach German I and II and conversational German, will participate in an orientation program in Washington, D.C., from Aug. 19-23 in preparation for her El Camino College teaching activities.

MRS. MERZLAK, who has been an instructor in language arts at El Camino since 1951, will arrive in Le Harve, France, Wednesday aboard the S.S. United States. Arrangements for transportation of both instructors were made by the United State Educational Commission Foundation in Austria.

Before assuming teaching duties in Linz, Mrs. Merzlak will attend summer school classes at the University of Vienna at Strobl/Wolfgangsee from July 14-Aug. 24. Immediately thereafter she will spend a week in Vienna for an introduction to the Austrian secondary school system.

Dr. Steffelbauer will arrive at the El Camino College campus Sept. 3. She has traveled extensively and has studied in England, Italy, Czechoslovakia and Austria. In 1953 she traveled in Spain and Morocco. She has taught in both Linz and Vienna and speaks French in addition to German and English.

Previous exchange teachers to El Camino include Leslie Edwards, England; Gerhardus A. M. Snijders, Netherlands; Loyd Newcomer, Hawaii; Dr. Frieda Staud, Austria, and Dr. Ivar Bjornal, Norway.

David P. Hurford, regional public director for Sears, Roebuck, and Co. and volunteer camping chairman, accepted the flags.

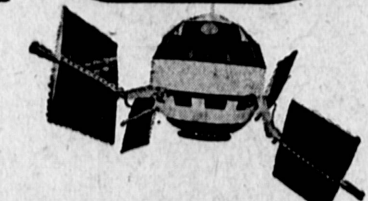
