Nicholas Drale, chairman of the council committee for the college, told The HERALD Tuesday, "Torrance has offered more than any city in California to secure less expensive to develop, and more centrally located. We have met their own criteria, and if they do what is realistic and right, the college will be in Torrance."

The Rev. Mr. Beadles says that a number of the trustees now feel that Torrance has made offers that cannot be ignored. He referred to the last resolution adopted by the City Council. That resolution added that surrounding land would be zoned for use that is compatible with the colleg
The site in question in Torrance comprises three sections at the intersection of Sepulveda and Crenshaw Boulevards. It is owned by the Santa Fe Railroad, the Del Amo Estate Co., and the Standard Oil Co. of Cali-
fornia. The land is available for about $\$ 30,000$ per acre. -rnia. The land is avalable for about $\$ 30,000$ per acre.
Dr. Glenn S. Dumke, chancellor of the state college system, describes the Torrance site as a "working oil field, across from a tank farm, and split by a major "This is where the people of South Beades has replied, working oil field, across from tank farms, with their cities split by major highways." He adds that these should pose no problems, and serve only as excuses.

Information regarding results of the studies conducted for the report on the Peninsula site has not been made public by the trustees, so much of what is
said is speculation. But land acquisition remains the critical problem.

The Ladera Heights Civic Assn., which opposed the choice of Fox Hills Golf Course in March, this week adopted a resolution favoring the Torrance location.
Other groups, including the Lomita Chamber of Commerce and several adjoining civic and area-wide groups, have done the same.
"More than 95 per cent of the people in the area o be served favor the Torrance site," says Mayor Isen. We are hopeful the trustees will acceed to the wishes of the people to be served and locate the college wher they want it, namely in Torrance. his:
