Bigger Counties Moving Toward Voting Machines

With a new law in effect which requires all counties of more than 300,000 population to add and extra hour of voting—keeping the polls open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.—offi-cials in California's larger counties are taking a new look at the need for mechan-

ized election procedures.

Heart of the matter and inspiration for the fresh look at voting machines is the growing problem of recruit-ing election board personnel to conduct the balloting and

count the votes.

County clerks who opposed the bill before the legislature contend that the problem is already getting away from them and that the new law deem't provide any extra pay. doesn't provide any extra pay for the extra hour of work at the polling place.

The scope of the problem is illustrated by the Los Angeles recruiting program. Los Angeles must recruit approximately 96,000 election day workers to man its precincts, and officials feel the extra hour of work work to make the

and officials feel the extra
hour of work won't make the
task any easier.

Most political observers
feel that voting machines offer an effective solution to
the problem. They not only
reduce the number of precinct workers required but
substantially speed the vote
counting process.

A recent critic of voting
machines, however, was Van
Dempsey, executive secretary
of the Democratic State Central Committee. He charged

tral Committee. He charged that voting machines used in San Francisco resulted in a san Francisco resulted in a serious voting dropoff, par-ticularly as the voter pro-ceeds down California's notor-iously long ballot.

Dempsey's figures, how-ever, were based on machines which have been in use for

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more than 40 years and which feature a horizontal ballot. San Mateo County recently

installed the new Shoup voting machine and used it in the 1962 election. It had a the 1962 election. It had a 14.2 per cent overall drop-off from the total vote cast as its voters worked through eight state-wide offices and 25 propositions on the long ballot. San Francisco — with its older machines — averaged 29.8 per cent and Alameda and Contra Costa, each using hand-marked paper ballots, dropped of 19.3 and 15.9 respectively.
