(Continued from Page 15) Sweet 'n Sour Salad Dressing Mix together '4 cup of each of the following; olive oil, lemon juice, sugar and chili sauce. Mix well, chill and serve.

#### **Cranberry Muffins**

For very tender muffins use pastry flour. If you are using all-purpose flour, use 1-7/s cups. For sweeter

muffins increase to 1/4	cup or more to taste.
2 cups pastry flour	1 cup milk
3 tsps. baking powder	4 tbsps. melted butter
1/2 tsp. salt	1 or 2 eggs beaten light
2 tbsps. sugar	1 cup drained whole cran-
	berries (1 lb. can)

Mix and sift dry ingredients. Add milk and butter to eggs and add to flour mixture all at once. Stir only enough to dampen flour. Take out about 1/4 cup of flour and sprinkle it over cranberries. Stir into batter last. Spoon into buttered muffin pans until two thirds full. Bake about 20 minutes or more at 400 degrees. Makes 1-2 dozen depending on size.

#### Pumpkin Chiffon Pie

i umputu en	
egg yolks	2 tsps. gelatin,
cup sugar	softened in
1/4 cups canned pumpkin	1/4 cup water
2 cup milk	3 egg whites
2 tsp., each salt, ginger	Baked pie shell (9-inch)
nutmeg, and cinnamon	1/2 cup heavy cream

Beat egg yolks with 1/2 cup sugar and add pumpkin, milk and seasonings. Cook and stir in double boiler until thick. Add gelatin, and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Cool. When beginning to thicken, fold in egg whites, beaten until stiff with remaining sugar. Pour into pie shell. Chill. Garnish with whipped cream.

**Chess** Pie

1 cup light brown sugar 2 eggs, well beaten 1/2 cup butter, melted 1/4 cup broken walnuts 1 tsp. vanilla 1/4 cup broken pecans

Mix all ingredients together. Pour into unbaked 8" pie shell and bake in a moderate oven, 375 de-grees for about 35 minutes. Serves 8. Garnish with whipped cream or ice cream if desired.
