Dear Ann Landers: Please keep encouraging girls as well as boys to get a high school diploma and then go on and get some sort of train ing which will enable them to earn a living later in fife if they have to

I knew it all, Nobody could I knew it all, Nobody could tell me anything. My husband was 22 and had a college de-gree. I was beautiful and sweet and he didn't think it was important for me to stay in high school and get my diploma. Why should I have to know anything? He would take care of me for the rest of my life! So, my heavy-hearted father walked me down the aisle and I was married at 17.

We had three children in

We had three children in six years. I devoted myself to my family. My husband went to night school and got a master's degree in business administration. Strange that he appreciated the value of education for himself-but not for me.

Five weeks ago my hus-

band dropped dead of a heart attack at the age of 42. He left \$15,000 in insurance and a \$20,000 mortgage on our home, plus some big bills. I have three children to send to college within the next five years, I must go to work but I'm not trained for anything. I realize now as never before the necessity of pre-paring for the future, since none of us knows what it may

Please print this letter as a warning from someone who had to learn the hard way.
