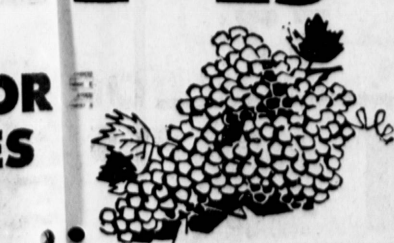

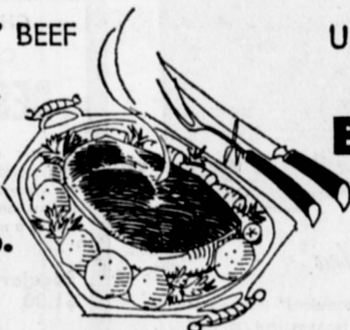

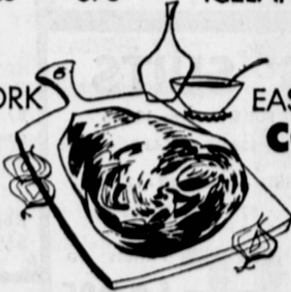

Japanese Girl Seeks Sponsor at El Camino

Yoshiko Kagitani is a graduate student at Toyo Eiwa Jogakuin Junior College in Tokyo, Japan. She wants to come to the United States to study at El Camino College.

Miss Kagitani, in a letter addressed to The HERALD, says she has "entertained a burning desire to go to the United States" since she began to study English. Her letter was written after an American friend told her to do her best to achieve her dream.

This young Japanese student has a pen pal in the United States who graduated from El Camino College. "I would like to meet her and to go to El Camino," says Miss Kagitani.

SHE WROTE to the college, and they advised her that a sponsor living in the El Camino College area would be required. Miss Kagitani wrote to ask that The HERALD lend a helping hand in her search

for an American family which would sponsor her studies at El Camino.

Her father has a patent office of his own, and her mother remains at home. A brother, 27, is a bank employee. An older sister, 24, is an interior designer in Tokyo.

SHE WOULD study child and adolescent psychology at El Camino College. She loves children, and hopes to dedicate her life to "establishing a unity of the minds of children for a better and more peaceful future."

Veteran Service Officer Has Tips for Recent Vets

Recently discharged servicemen and women were advised today to check at the local County Veterans Service Office for counseling and assistance in matters to be taken care of immediately after discharge.

Loren Heft, veterans service officer in Inglewood and Torrance, said the veteran should attend to several important matters pertaining to his military service and civilian employment in a short time after his release. At the same time he will be able to find out about any veterans benefits he might be in line for as a result of service.

HEFT SUGGESTED the following check list for the immediate attention of the discharged serviceman.

- Notify your draft board of your release and give the board your current address. This should be done in the first five days.
- Call at the nearest office of the Armed Force Reserve to determine whether you still

have any reserve service obligation.

- You have a legal right, in most cases, to reinstatement to your old civilian job, but your employer must be advised of your availability within 90 days of separation.

- IF YOU ARE looking for a new job, register at the local State Department of Employment Office. Your service should entitle you to unemployment compensation should you have difficulty securing a job.

- Check the separation papers for accuracy in every detail. Errors and omissions should be called to the attention of your branch of service for correction and/or addition.

- Record your separation papers with the County Recorder, have photostatic copies made of the original, then store the originals in a safe place which is known to your family.

Recruits Get Choice for Sub Training

High school graduates meeting basic qualifications for submarine duty may enlist in the Navy with a guarantee of assignment either to nuclear power, electronics, or polaris missile technical school, it was reported here this week by Chief VanDorne E. Isaak, recruiter at the Torrance Recruiting Office, 1520 Cravens Ave.

Basic qualifications require the applicant to have a high school diploma, be above average in intelligence, and have good physical qualities.
