I've been getting no little static from the gun nuts in recent days, and I must say that the more I read these communiques the leerier I get of the species.

There is a rather creepy self-righteousness about most of them, like a Reverend caught in a brothel.

"Regulate us?" The tone of outrage is exquisitely pained. These guys are convinced the country (which, of course, they built) will sink like the lost Atlantis if anything is done to patrol effectively the \$250 million annual firearms and shooting accessories biz.

I have come to the conclusion that the private gun users, and their spokesman, the National Rifle Association, are just about the most spoiled minority in this

After the horrible events in Dallas, I recommended that Congress pass an act permitting appropriate police agencies to distribute mail-order rifles, of the kind that killed President Kennedy.

The howl from the Gun Lobby was blood-curdling. You would think I had urged that every gun in the country be put into some gigantic hellbox and fused back into metal. The peals were so loud as to suggest, to a suspicious mind like mine, that maybe there was a little guilty knowledge around.

I have also concluded that police supervision of mail order rifles, while about all that could possibly be hoped for on a national level at this time, is far from adequate protection against the kooks who wield all kinds of guns for illegal purposes.

An automobile, with some rightness, is often described as a lethal weapon. But an automobile is not a lethal weapon by definition as guns and rifles and other shooting devices are.

Would it not be possible on a state level to impose the same kind of responsibilities and licenses on a gun owner as on a car owner?

That he be able to use his tool, that he be of age, that he pay a fee for a license, that he register his hardware, that he be fingerprinted and mugged, and that the tool be taken from him when he has demonstrated he is unfit to use it?

To this the gun nut, having been well brainwashed by the National Rifle Association, will reply to you that driving a car is a privilege, but owning a gun is a right.

This is bull, pure and simple, as I've already pointed out more than once. The Constitution of this Nation does not anywhere, or in any sense, offer its protection to those nimble and virile laddies who gun the birds and the beasts.

The Constitution, in the Bill of Rights, simply asserts the right of State militias to be armed, to protect against the actions of a possibly predatory central

In a superb illustration of Big Lie technique, this protection has been extrapolated by the Gun Lobby to protect and bless the follower of game sports and the gun lover per se. "The right of the people to bear arms" is the way they put it.

It's important to realize, in any discussion of this problem, that no such right exists, or has existed. \*

Yet if gun lovers are really as much in love with their weapons as the NRA and the gun dealers are constantly suggesting, it is hardly likely that they will give up guns because they will need a license to shoot 'em. I don't think many car sales are lost because licenses are obligatory.

To be sure, the dealers will lose the custom of the likes of the Dallas killers. But it could be that they are too young and too decent to need that kind of loot anyhow. I'd like to hear from them on the subject.

Trustees of the Torrance Unified School District have approved a new district policy on athletic teams, contests, and supplies.

Under the new policy, district high schools will maintain a balanced athletic program under the rules of the Califortees.

THE RULES authorize sizes for all squads, ranging from 40 members on each of four divisions in football to 18 members for the varsity and jayvee vary with the size of the school in some cases. A total of the school in some cases.
