Wage Credits For Service

Both wartime and peacetime veterans are advised that their military service entitles them to Social Security wage credits at the rate of \$160 for each month of active service.

County Service Officer Arthur H. Tryon stated that those eligible are veterans who had at least 90 days active service between Sept. 16, 1940 and Dec. 31, 1956 and those discharged other than dishonorable.

Benefits include monthly retirement payments, disability payments, monthly payments to dependent survivors and lump-sum death payments to widows or widowers.

Wage credits also apply in the case of veterans who have less than the 90-day period during the years described above, if they were discharged or released because of disability or injury in line of duty.

Credits apply for those who died in active service as well as for those who died after discharge when an eligible survivor files a Social S e c u r ity benefits claim.
