

Local Agency Aide to Talk **To Lomitans**

The workings of the Local Agency Formation Commission which has been set up in the county to pass on incorpora-tion and annexation proposals will be explained to Lomita area residents and property owners Tuesday evening, ac-cording to May W. Ross, sec-retary of the Committee Op-posing Incorporation of the Lomita Civic League.

Lomita Civic League. S. M. Schmidt, staff officer of the new commission will speak at the meeting sched-uled for 8 p.m. in the Fleming Junior High School auditorium. Secretary Ross said the meet-ing was scheduled to explain the commission to persons "who have been misled the commission to persons "who have been misled through olcal propagands against the commission by per-sons whose proposals were un-sound."

In accepting the invitation to speak before the Civic League, Schmidt wrote "The Local Agency Formation Com-mission was not created for the benefit or detriment of any one group or agency within one group or agency within Los Angeles County. On the contrary, its purpose is to re-view and make determinations concerning incorporation and annexation proposals from a perspective that includes the entire county." Schmidt added that 'in gen-

eral terms, the Commission's objective is to cure some very specific ills that are common to all metropolitan areas."

Tomorrow is the final day Tomorrow is the final day for non-citizens to report their addresses to the Immigration and Naturalization Service as required under the provisions of the 1952 Immigration Act. George K. Rosenberg, dis-trict director of the Immigra-tion Service said more then tion Service, said more than 40,000 aliens must file before tomorrow's deadline. The alien address cards are available at all United States Post Offices and the district office of the

Immigration and Naturaliza-tion Service. Persons having diplomatic status, representatives of cer-tain international organiza-tions and agricultural laborers admitted to the United States admitted to the United States

admitted to the Omited States temporarily do not need to file the reports. More than half a million aliens are now living in South-ern California, said Rosenberg.
