



\$2.4 Million **Project Gets** Green Light

Allocation of \$600,000 as the county share of the cost of a beach erosion control program which will create nearly 45 acres of new beach in the Redondo Beach-Torrance area has been approved by the County Board of

The supervisors acted on motion of Burton W. Chace in declaring their intention to budget the funds in the 1964-65 fiscal year. Total cost of the project is estimated at \$2.4 million, to be shared by the state, county, and federal governments.

The project will create beach land worth an estimated \$7.8 million.

In project will create beach land worth an estimated \$7.8 million. It will increase the beach area between Redondo Beach and Malaga Cove in Palos Verdes by more than 300 per cent.

THE PROJECT was authorized by Congress, which authorized \$1.2 million as the federal share. The state has appropriated its share, and county action this week cleared the decks for immediate plan. the decks for immediate plan-

ming.

More than 1.7 million cubic yards of sand and nearly 35,000 tons of rock will be moved once construction be-gins. The project will widen Redondo Beach, Clifton Beach, and Torrance Beach from 50 to 150 feet.

Details of the construction

work will be worked out by County Engineer Jahn A. Lambie in cooperation with the U.S. Corps of Engineers and the State Department of Water Resources.

PRESENT beaches contain 10.8 acres of usable area. That will be increased by 44 acres, bringing the total useable beach area to 54.8 acres.

The program, authorized by public law 780, adopted by the Congress last year, is designed to control erosion of the beach front. Details of the project will be worked out immediately and the program is expected to begin soon, according to Chace.
