

A Few Ground Rules for Choosing the Right Bait

Sunday, I wrote about the henefits of perfume. Today I'll tell you about the different bases involved, to aid you in selecting the type you wish to wear-and remember, you "wear" perfume, which is as much an accessory as good jewelry.

One never asks, "What perfume are you using?" but rather, "What perfume are you wear-

Shop for your own personal signature scent as carefully as you do for your furs and diamonds. Never, never be rushed into purchasing something you're not sure about. And make your choice from these basic varieties.

Floral blends are undoubtedly the most popular, and with good reason. Flowers speak of romance and youth. There is the single floral, which can be lily of the valley, orange blossom, rose, lilac, magnolia, and others.

It is always a good idea to have several of these in your collection, especially if you're trying to get the man to pop the ques-

give a fresh spring-like effect to the air in which you walk. Musk or vetiver, a cool, lemon-like base, is often added to give body to the blend.

For formal occasions, when you want to feel exotic and daring, research the spicy blends, which have the essences of vanilla, ginger, cloves, and a dash of the floral blossoms from heady flowers.

Beware, though: this is the most difficult group from which to select your own intimate scent. Keep in mind that spicy blends are summer perfumes.

A heavy blend such as the Oriental blend is considered extremely sophisticated and romantic. Every woman in her 30s or 40s should have several of this type in her wardrobe.

But be most careful when you wear an Oriental blend. It can be extremely overpowering.

The fruit blend contains mixtures of oranges, lemons, apricots, peaches, even apples, for a cool, outdoorsy feeling.

Match you scents, always; never mix them. Bath oils soaps and perfumes should all be of the same fragrance or at least the same base.

Application is an art as well. Remember all your pulse spots; the wrists, crook of the elbow temples, cleavage, throat, even behind your knees.

Run the stopper across your eyebrows, and saturate a small piece of cotton to place in your

If you have a spray, use it on the hems of your dresses or your lingerie, but never, never apply directly to fabrics or furs.

Remember, it has an oil base and may permanently stain your

Oily skin requires less perfume, whereas a dry skin needs more.

And use your perfume, don't hoard it. It's one of the greatest investments and lifts you can buy yourself.
