

Garden Checklist



- 1. If you haven't started your gladioli planting, do so. If you have set out some more for a longer period of bloom.
2. Do not forget cannas. This is a good time to set them out.
3. Your bearded iris foliage may be getting brown on the tips. Cut them back half way so they're not so unsightly.
4. Ivy first aphids should be visiting your plants. Give them a shot of all-purpose spray.
5. Ivy that's looking dismal can stand to be cut back hard. You can take nearly all the leaves off it—and it will reward you by coming back better than ever.

Pityriasis Rosea Common in Teens, Early Twenties

Pityriasis rosea, more familiarly known as P.R., is a skin disease of relatively common occurrence. Though it's neither serious nor long-lasting, it is unsightly and, while it lasts, is a source of concern and distress to the afflicted person.

IDENTIFICATION OF the disease is not difficult because the characteristic lesions are usually easily identifiable. When they arrear on the scalp, however, the condition may be confused with ringworm, or with syphilis in those cases where the soles of the feet are involved.

The cause of the disease is not yet known. An infectious agent, possibly a virus, has been suspected because, among other things, an attack of the disease seems to confer permanent immunity against further attacks.

OFTEN THE FIRST sign of pityriasis rosea is a single lesion which is, appropriately enough, called the "herald plaque" or "patch." This first or primary lesion is most frequently seen on the leg, arm, or torso, but, though it resembles the other lesions in appearance, it is larger.

The rash, which follows the appearance of the herald patch in about 6 to 10 days, may be restricted to a small area of the body or diffused over the trunk and the upper portions of the extremities. Much less frequently the face, scalp, palms of the hands, and the soles of the feet may be involved.
