Museum To Show Bonzais

Bonsai — the centuries-old Japanese art of training minia-ture trees, begins an eight-day exhibition Sunday in the sev-enth annual Bonsai Exhibit at the California Museum of Science and Industry, Exposi-tion Park.

Some 200 trees will be on

display, each representing in-dividual efforts by 100 mem-bers of the California Bonsai

society, organization sponsor-ing the exhibit.

A wide variety of bonsai styles will be featured at this year's exhibition, including: yose-ue, several trees planted to resemble a forest; ikadato resemble a forest; ikada-buki, several trees growing from one trunk; and ishitsuki, in which the roots are exposed, clasping the rocks like a claw.

ANOTHER WILL BE the cascade style, in which the upper branches are trained to rest below the root level, repre-senting trees in the natural state growing on steep hillside

slopes.

A number of trees grown from native California seed-lings will be shown, in addition

lings will be snown, in addition to those originally brought from Japan and other parts of the world.

Highlight of the eight-day show will be a daily lecture-demonstration at 2 p.m. each afternoon, on the techniques of bonesi cultivation by a more bonsai cultivation by a mem-ber of the California Bonsai

ber of the Society.

The Museum is open Monday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on Sunday from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. There is no admission charge.

running from Playa del Rey to the Palos Verdes hills because of brine intrusion which has of orine intrusion which has destroyed many fresh water wells in the West Coast Basin. The barrier will supply water to injection wells which will create a mound or barrier against further saline contamination.

The present unit, begun under a contract awarded more than a year ago, begins near Aviation and El Segundo boulevards and runs generally south to its termination at Prospect Avenue and Torrance Boulevard in Redondo Beach.
