Transfer of a 1,130 foot Torrance area storm drain to the County Flood Control District has been approved by the

Board of Supervisors. The drain was offered to the district by the Chanslor-West-ern Oil and Development Co., under terms of a resolution dated last Dec. 20.

The project, of reinforced concrete pipe construction be-gins at the intersection of Elm and Emerald streets, runs east to the Santa Fe Co. right of way, and southeast to the in-tersection of Crenshaw Boule-vard and Dominguez.

The drain will be integrated into the over-all flood control and water conservation network being developed by the district throughout the county.
