Today's guest cook has contributed three of her favorite recipes for foreign dishes.

STUFFED MANICOTTI

2 lbs. ricotta cheese 1/2 lb. mozzarelli cheese, diced 2 eggs

1/2 cup Parmesan cheese 1 tbsp. chopped parsley

salt, and pepper 16 manicotti (large macaroni)

Mix ricotta, mozzarelli, eggs, grated cheese and chopped parsley. Season with salt, and pepper. Mix until well blended.

Into 6 qt. of boiling water place 4 manicotti and parboil for 3 minutes. Carefully remove manicotti from water with strainer spoon and fill with cheese mixture. Continue until all the manicottis are cooked and filled.

Cover bottom of baking dish with spaghetti sauce. Arrange filled manicotti side by side in a single layer in baking dish. Cover with remainder of sauce and bake in moderate oven 350 degrees for 20 minutes. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Serves 8.

STUFFED MUSHROOMS 1 cup bread crumbs.

1 lb. large mushrooms 3 tbs. grated Parmesan cheese

1 ths. chopped parsley 2 tbs. melted butter

6 tbs. olive oil clove garlic, chopped small onion, chopped salt and pepper

Clean and remove stems from mushrooms. Mix thoroughly bread crumbs, cheese, parsley, butter, garlic, onion, salt, and pepper. Fill mushroom caps.

Pour 2 tablespoons of oil in bottom of baking pan. Place mushrooms in pan, stuffed side up. Pour balance of oil equally over all mushrooms. Bake about 20 minutes in medium oven. When mushrooms are tender and tops are brown, remove from oven. Serve very hot. Enough for 4 to 6.

HUNGARIAN PORK AND SAUERKRAUT GOULASH 1 large onion, minced

2 pounds sauerkraut, drained

2 tbs. paprika

1½ pounds lean pork, cubed 1 cup sour cream

Boiled potatoes.

1 tsp. caraway seeds

11/2 cups water

1/4 tsp. pepper

2 bay leaves

1 tsp. sugar Simmer sauerkraut with water, seasonings and sugar 45 minutes. In large heavy skillet or Dutch oven saute onion in fat until golden. Add paprika and stir until dark red. Add pork and let cook several minutes. Add sauerkraut mixture and blend. Simmer slowly at least 1 hour, covered. Check toward end of cooking time; if very dry, add a little meat stock or water. Just before serving stir in sour cream and heat. Serve with potatoes. Serves 6.
