Regional Park Plan Rejected

Proposals to establish Proposals to establish a 20,000-acre regional park in the Santa Monica Mountains under special assessment dis-tricts were abandoned Tuesday afternoon when the Board of Supervisors rejected the spe-cial district idea.

cial district idea.

The supervisors did, however, ask the state to earmark the land for a regional park in the \$150 million state park bond issue to be placed on the November ballot.

CONTROVERSY over the CONTROVERSY over the proposed park had raged for more than two years, with proponents arguing the park is needed. They proposed the creation of a special district with the power to levy a property tax of 5 cents per \$100 assessed valuation to support the park.

The district would have included castal cities from Santa

The district would have in-cluded coastal cities from Santa Monica to the southern limit of Torrance. Of the 14 cities included, 12 cities had adopted resolutions opposing the crea-tion of the new taxing agency.

MAYOR William F. Czuele-ger of Redondo Beach and Beverly Hills councilman Leonard Horwin led the opponents of the park in their fight be-fore the Board of Supervisors. It was Horwin who proposed the state financing for the

State Senator Thomas Rees state Senator Homas Rece-plans to ask the state to in-clude the 20,000 acres in the state bond issue, according to Horwin. Horwin said he had talked with Rees only moments before the hearing on the mat-
