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Veterans Groups to Pay

Property Taxes in 1964

County Assessor Philip E. Watson this week announced the exemption formerly granted to property owned by veterans' organizations chartered by Congress has been ruled unconstitutional by the Los Angeles county counsel.

Watson said the ruling follows one by the attorney general's office which ruled section 215 of the Revenue and Taxation Code unconstitutional. Under the county counsel's opinion, real property owned by such organizations will be fully taxable in 1964.

Personal property, said Watson, will be exempt.

The county counsel quoted from a 1956 decision of the fillinois Supreme Court in ruling the exemption is unconstitutional. The decision said that such purposes as fostering love for country and respect for civil institutions are "patriotic, laudable, and public spiriotic, laud

7,400 persons.
