A great part of the joy of living in Southern California lies in the knowledge that our children are being raised in a marvelously warm and healthful climate that encourages outdoor activity.

Unfortunately our open spaces are rapidly being developed with little provision for parks and recreational facilities. We may well see the day when our residents and their children will be living in an "asphalt jungle," deprived of that precious opportunity for outdoor activity.

As a means of correcting this situation, I propose the following:

1. More and larger parcels of land set aside for parks, athletics, and recreational activities.
2. Closer cooperation between the city and the Torrance Unified School District to better utilize parks and playgrounds.
3. The hiring of an additional number of well-trained counselors to instruct and supervise recreational programs.
4. The development of additional recreational and crafts programs for the use of our Senior Citizens who are also in need of ways to utilize their leisure time.

With your help these recommendations can become realities.
