As an attorney I say my husband ought to realize this woman committed a criminal offense and that she should pay the penalty. We have argued this back and forth and we want your opinion. Thank you. — TEN TO ONE

Dear One: What good are laws if people decide for themselves they are going to ignore the law and make up their own rules?

The judge will decide if this woman is entitled to probation. If she has children living at home she could conceivably escape prison and be required to repay the money over a specified period of time.

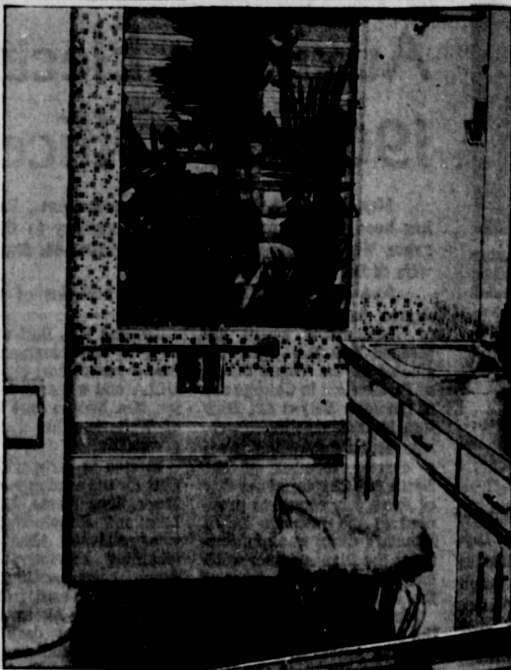
First for Dianas

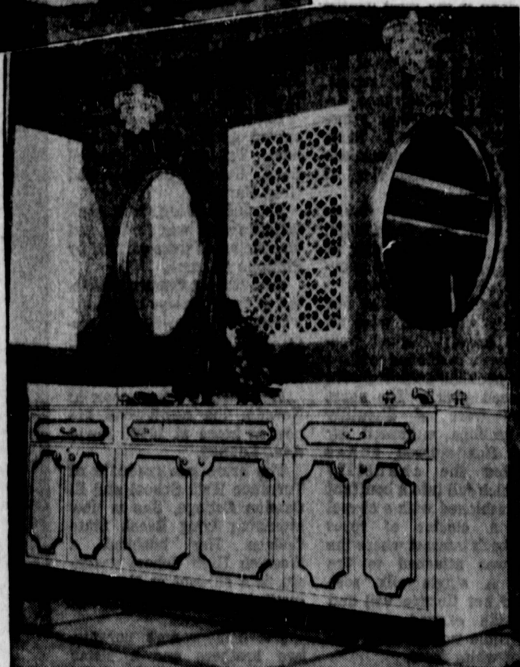

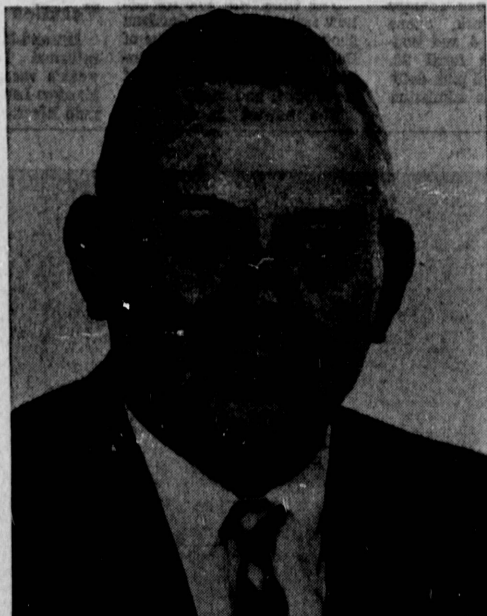
