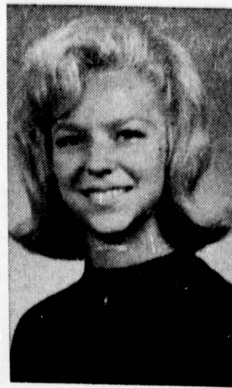
Her fiancé is the son of Mrs. Frank Flint, 3924 Newton St., and Mr. Marco Mazarovich, 24431 Winlock Dr.

Bringing Up Baby
