Steven Price, a senior at Bishop Montgomery High School, has been declared a national winner in the feature story contest sponsored by Quill and Scroll, national honorary society for high school journalists.

Persons must register before Thursday if:

- They will be 21 on or before June 2 and have not registered;
- They have changed their name, address, or party affiliation since they last registered;
- They did not vote in the November, 1962, general election; or
- They are new to California and meet the residence requirements of one year in the state, 90 days in the county, and 54 days in the precinct.
