Miss Kathleen Hooker in a full length yellow gown was the maid of honor. She car-ried a bouquet of yellow car-nations and daffodils.


Bridesmaids were Misses Janet Hay and Cindy Watson, They wore pastel green gowns and each carried yel-low daffodils.




