What is the most important problem facing the Torrance City Council?

Putting Torrance back on the high level it enjoyed previously in the esteem of Los Angeles County. Erase the reflection cast on the city by news media and statements from the District Attorney's and the Attorney General's office. Secure closer cooperation between the council and the various commissions in city government to insure better living for the residents of Torrance.

What do you feel you can contribute toward the solution of this problem?

What is the most important problem facing the Torrance City Council?

The most important problem facing the Torrance City Council at the present time and in the near future will be that of properly planning the use of the land in the city of Torrance in the best possible way. My plan would be to annex outlying unincorporated areas which lie adjacent to the Torrance city boundaries. The City of Torrance has grown by approximately 60,000 persons in the last ten years and it appears that the City of Torrance will be the third largest city in the county with a possible population of approximately 200,000 by the year 1970. Therefore, it appears that one of the major problems facing the City Council in the next four years will be that of passing the necessary ordinances to create the best possible uses for land in the Torrance area so that Torrance will continue to be a model city to live in.

What do you feel you can contribute toward the solution of this problem?

I feel that I can contribute toward the solution of the growing pains of Torrance by using the knowledge that I have obtained as a working member of the greater Pittsburgh Chamber of Commerce. From 1953 to 1955, I worked for the program, "Pittsburgh Rebuilds for the Future" in conjunction with the Chamber of Commerce of Pittsburgh which helped rebuild industry and after the war, encouraged industry and also encouraged suburban sub-division and new home building. I further feel that my experience in the general practice of law puts me in close contact with the everyday problems of city government and my experience as a Deputy District Attorney for Los Angeles County certainly helped me to understand the function of county government. I certainly hope that the people of Torrance will give me an opportunity to serve the city as a City Councilman.

What is the most important problem facing the Torrance City Council?

There are currently two problems; the restoration of confidence by the citizens in their city government, and the use of land within the city.

What do you feel you can contribute toward the solution of this problem?

With respect to the restoration of confidence—by taking decisive action, as is currently being done, to insure competent, efficient, honest government. Intelligent land use demands a comprehensive master plan in a rapidly growing city such as Torrance. It is difficult to set up such a plan but it is not impossible. It is necessary for Torrance's future well-being. I intend to spur its enactment.
