(Continued from Page 1) also have substantial space available.

DISTRICT-WIDE, however, one new school—Joseph Arnold in South Torrance—will be opened, and classroom additions at several more will be complete. Enrollment forecasts actually predict a surplus of 143 pupil stations for next year, but their location does not always—if ever—coincide with areas where the extra desks are needed.

Growth potential in the Madrona, Victor, and Adams school areas will require additional buildings in the future, but money is not available at this time. Dr. J. H. Hull and his staff have proposed some minor boundary revisions to take the load away from the Victor and Madrona areas, and some mobile classrooms can be moved.

Board members, however, would prefer—if last week's board meeting is any indication—to move children who are bussed to central schools for basic skills classes.

THE BASIC skills classes, taught by special teachers and limited to a maximum of 18 students, are located in schools which are at the center of a five- or six-school area. Dr. Louis Kaplan, assistant superintendent for special services, objects to moving the basic skills classes again.

Dr. Kaplan says, "moving these children from year to year is a bad thing, especially when these children need stability." He says central sites were selected for minimum bus trips and adds that constant moving is disastrous to the basic skills program.

Board President Bert M. Lynn and Mrs. Kenneth E. Watts argue the welfare of the district means some more moving for the basic skills classes. Both say they do not want to "move these kids," but they add, "We only have so much money."

LYNN GOES farther to argue that basic skills enrollment is about 1 1/2 per cent of the total enrollment of the district and the board should be concerned "about the other 98 1/2 per cent, too."

Any solution for this next school year, however, is likely to include some moving of basic skills classes and some boundary changes.

Whatever the results of Monday's deliberations, board members and the administrative staff are emphatic about one thing, and they echo it in chorus: There will be no double sessions in Torrance next year if it's at all possible to prevent them.

(Continued from Page 1) partment and provide additional funds for the libraries.

Citing increased sales tax revenues, the report also suggested more money can be spent on the libraries as the need for large capital expenditures for parks and recreation decreases.

Additional personnel are needed, said the report, to provide for a full-time professional librarian at all branch libraries. The League also said the present practice of closing one day during the week should be changed. Some members even suggested the libraries remain open on Sunday.

Suggestions that public school teachers should assist young people in learning to use the library, that obsolete materials be weeded out to provide space for reference materials for students, and that additional money be spent for books rather than films, tapes, or records also were contained in the report.

The League report concluded by recognizing the recommendations could not be implemented overnight, but added, "we do urge the City Council to give thoughtful consideration to these suggestions. We sincerely believe Torrance should have an adequate library system which is so necessary for the cultural growth of this community."

The report will be given to the City Council for possible action, but when it will be placed on the agenda is not known.
