Board President Bert M. Lynn and Mrs. Kenneth E. Watts argue the welfare of the district means some more moving for the basic skills classes. Both say they do not want to "move these kids," but they add, "We only have so much money." o much money."

LYNN GOES farther to argue that basic skills enrollment is about 1½ per cent of the total enrollment of the district and the board should be concerned "about the other 98½ per cent,

Any solution for this next school year, however, is likely to include some moving of basic skills classes and some

basic skills classes and some boundary changes.
Whatever the results of Monday's deliberations, board members and the administrative staff are emphatic about one thing, and they echo it in chorus: There will be no double sessions in Torrance next year if it's at all possible to prevent them.


