Torrance YWCA Offers Program To Combat Challenges of Spring

Spring has arrived and with it comes the challenge for new interests, new hair styles, a trimmer figure to fit into the new summer fashions as well as bathing suits, and a general need for a mental lift. For these challenges to the women of Torrance, the local YWCA is offering a series of new classes, in exercise, hair-styling, charm, art of conversation and recreations.

For the woman who wants her husband to join her in these spring activities there are classes in social dancing, guitar playing, little theatre work, volleyball and other diversions on the spring calendar at the YWCA.

In the "For Women Only" classification, courses in streamlining the figure include exercises Tuesday evenings, modern interpretative dance on Monday evenings and exercise with the Y-Wives who meet on Tuesday mornings. For self-improvement, a Cinderella Club meeting is held Tuesday afternoons from 1 until 2:30 includes exercise, help with hair and make-up problems. Geared especially for the housewife, in this class she will learn to set her hair in different styles. For fun, there will be lessons in bridge on Wednesday afternoons

from 1 to 3 p.m. with John McDonough as instructor. A mental lift if being offered in the "Art of Conversation" class every Wednesday, designed to promote ease in any speaking situation.

Social dancing classes are held on Thursday evenings. Roger Blowers, instructor, will teach Latin American dances, swing, Bossa Nova, twist and waltz. Intermediate guitar classes are on Wednesday evenings with folk dancing as an added attraction.

For men and women interested in a "fun" night, a "Mr. and Mrs. Recreation Night" is slated for Wednesdays with instruction in volleyball, badminton and exercises.

The Little Theater group for men and women meets Tuesday evenings from 8 to 10. Richard Gant, instructor, says there is still time to join this class before the early summer scheduled performance.

Teenage Girls

The Torrance YWCA is now taking registration for spring sessions for the teenage girl, offering classes in baton, flag twirling, good grooming, modeling, drama, square dancing and folk dancing. A class in drama for girls 12 to 15 years, is designed to teach voice, ease of movement, creativity by the study of pantomime and self-expression. Class in baton will feature flag twirling, baton, marching routines and solo work.

Dance classes include lessons in ballet, tap and interpretative. There is also an intermediate ballet class with Mrs. Mary Muzel as instructor. Tap dancing is offered to both boys and girls, 3 to 7 years old.

Mrs. Peggy Shiner is teaching a class for little girls in baton twirling. This class meets on Saturday from 3 to 4 p.m.

Saturday Play-Day, for girls 5 to 11 years of age, continues to be one of the most popular programs offered for girls in Torrance. A full day's program from 10 a.m. until 2:30 p.m., the girls participate in classes in art, drama, crafts and dance.

All instructors are adults, professionally qualified to teach in their fields.
