The apartments are now available for rent with Mr. and Mrs. Steve Bardwell, resident managers, handling rental arrangements.

Featured in the "Tournament" are built-in dishwashers, stove and oven combinations, and ceiling heat with thermostats in every room. All walls and ceilings are completely sound proofed, as are the floors.

FLUSH LIGHTING over all work areas eliminates shadows

while the housewife prepares meals. The television system is coaxial, with electric amplifiers added for perfect viewing.

The spacious two and three bedroom apartments are luxuriously carpeted and completely draped. Each apartment has two complete bathrooms. Furnished model apartments will be shown displaying furnishings which may be selected if a furnished apartment is desired.

High-lighting the recreational facilities offered at the apartment is a tournament sized golf putting green. Traditional recreational facilities include a heated swimming pool, cabana, ping-pong, shuffleboard and badminton.

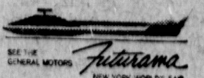
