Colorful Correspondent, Restaurateur Dies

Robert Ervin Reuben, who gave up a colorful and famous career as a foreign and war correspondent to establish and head a \$2 million restaurant and hotel in Manhattan Beach, died Monday of cancer at the Beverly Hills home of an uncle. Reuben, who was 45, had been ill for several months. He was the owner and president of the Pen and Quill at the time of his death. The first allied newsman to land in Nazi-held France on D-Day, Reuben gave up a career studded with many firsts in 1952 to enter the restaurant business. He was a former

president of the Manhattan Beach Chamber of Commerce and was active in many area civic and philanthropic organizations. During his career as a newsmen, Reuben interviewed such world leaders as Winston Churchill, Franklin D. Roosevelt, General Douglas MacArthur, Charles De Gaulle, Josef Stalin, and General Dwight D. Eisenhower. He was decorated by General Eisenhower and received a Presidential Unit Citation for his work in the war. Born in Omaha, Neb., in 1918, Reuben was raised in Iowa. He joined United Press in 1941, and later served as a correspondent for Reuters News Service of London. During the Second World War, Reuben became the first correspondent to land in Normandy, then later filed the first free news story from Germany since the beginning of the war. Captured by Russian troops when he crossed lines without proper credentials, he was the first American to enter fallen Berlin. Later, Reuben joined U. S. Forces in the Pacific and filed the first news story from occupied Tokyo. He worked for the National Broadcasting Co. from 1946 until he opened the Pen and Quill in 1952. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Evelyn Schwartz of Redondo Beach, and two uncles, Dr. Philip Reuben of Beverly Hills and Leonard Reuben of Hermosa Beach. Funeral arrangements were made at Groman Mortuary, 830 W. Washington Blvd., with interment at Hillside Memorial Park.

Edna Ruby O'Brien Funeral services were held Monday noon at Utter McKinley's Viewpark Mortuary for Edna Ruby O'Brien, sister of Louise Brundage of Torrance, who died April 16. Mrs. O'Brien, a longtime resident of Los Angeles, had lived in California for 40 years. Mrs. O'Brien, who resided at 1243 1/2 W. 93rd St., was 57, born in McCament, Tex., and had been employed as a saleslady for three years with Van de Kamp's Bakeries. In addition to her sister, Louise, she is survived by two other sisters, Helen Renier and Beth Baumstark; three brothers, Edwin, John, and William McCament; and her husband, James. Interment was at Inglewood Park Cemetery with Dr. Paul Waldschmidt, officiating.
