Lomita Road Work Given County Okay

Construction of three roadway drainage projects in Lomita has been authorized by the Board of Supervisors under a \$5,000 allocation voted last week.

The work will include the installation of crossflow gutters, curb returns and paving on Cayuga Avenue at 260th and 261st streets, Regent Avenue at 261st Street, and Eshelman Avenue at 263rd Street.

Asphaltic-concrete pavement will be added on 262nd Street west of Eshelman Avenue to control storm runoff and prevent ponding of water in the area.
