Torrance High closed out its Pioneer League duel meet track campaign Friday afternoon with a convincing 73-39 win over injury-riddled West High.

Despite its one-sided loss, West generated the most excitement with shot putter Scott Steele turning in the finest individual performance of the afternoon.

Steele, only a sophomore, snapped the West varsity mark with a put of 49 ft. 11 1/2 in. Previously, the best put Steele had managed was 43 ft.

John Cochran, the old stan-

dard bearer, broke his record by three inches with a toss of 47 ft. 4 in. and finished second.

Flame-haired John Grim won two events in pacing the Tartar triumph. Grim captured the 100-yard dash in 10.5 seconds and won the long jump at 20 ft. 8 in. He also finished second behind teammate Pat Lewandowski in the 220.

Mike Hatter, the Pioneer League's top high hurdler, won his pet event in 15.9 seconds but lost the 180-yard lows to George Sharp of West. Sharp turned the distance in 20.9 seconds.

Narbonne High sprinter Albert Thompson won both dash events Friday afternoon as the Gauchos romped to a 61-43 track triumph over Marine League foe Carson High.

Thompson, regarded as one of the City's top sprinters, won the century in 10.1 seconds and the 220 in 22.5 seconds.

Although Narbonne dominated the shorter running events, Carson's distance men came up with expected victories. Tom Whitley won the 880 in 2:05.5 and Javier Jaramillo romped to a 4:40.8 run in the mile.
