CFWC to Install **Historic Bell**



The California Federation of Women's Clubs, Los Cer-ritos District, will install the bell early in May and will dedicate it with appropriate ceremonies.


Banning Park is located in the 15th District, represented by Councilman John S. Gib son Jr.
