

Redondo Youth Baseball Parade Slated Saturday

Redondo Beach's annual Youth Baseball Parade will be held Saturday at 11 a.m., with floats and marching units representing area little leagues marching along the Catalina Avenue route.

Trophies will be awarded for the best over-all float, the best theme float, and the most original float. A special commissioner's trophy will go to the outstanding float entered by a league affiliated with the Redondo Beach Youth Baseball Council.

The reviewing stand will be located in front of the Elks Hall. The parade will move south from Carnelian Street on Catalina Avenue to Vista Del Mar in the Hollywood Riviera section of Torrance.

Torrance Little League, the Torrance Area Youth Band, the Bishop Montgomery Drill Team will represent Torrance in the parade. Pacific Little League, which covers part of Torrance, will enter a float saluting the 25th anniversary of little league baseball.

Seventeen-year-old June Wilson, a student at Aviation High, is queen of the parade.

Trustees Change School Boundary

Temporary boundary changes in the Victor Elementary School which will eliminate overcrowding and double sessions next year were approved in principle by the Board of Education this week.

Similar changes affecting Madrona Elementary School also won approval from the trustees, but a plan for Fern-Greenwood and Torrance schools was held for further study.

Golf Clubhouse Job Under Way

Construction of the new Western Avenue Golf Courses clubhouse was started Friday by the contractor, La-Ke Construction Co.

The 14,000 square-foot building is being financed with funds from the golf course and the County Retirement Board. It will be completed in about 10 months.

Plans at Victor School call for the addition of two mobile classrooms at the site. The mobile units will be moved from Howard Wood School.

BOUNDARY changes will send children living east of Anza Avenue in the area bounded by Torrance Boulevard, Hawthorne Avenue, and Spencer Street to Anza Elementary School, where classrooms are available. Students living in the area east of Anza and north of Spencer Street who now attend Victor School will go to Flavian School next year.

Dr. Louis Kaplan said children who will be in the eighth grade will be able to continue in classes at Victor School through a permit system.

In the Madrona School area, the district plans to bus children who move into the development now under way near Hawthorne Avenue and Del Amo Boulevard to schools in the North Torrance area.

THE CHANGES will allow the district enough time to complete necessary construction at Madrona and Victor schools.

In a related move, the trustees approved initial site plans for the expansion of the two schools and ordered the architects to proceed with initial design plans.

The Fern-Greenwood and Torrance Elementary school problems will be restudied by the special services office of the district and presented to the board at its next meeting.

PV Man Notes Red Cross Help to Quake Victims

Red Cross has spent about \$125,000 in Alaska following the earthquake, according to Albert W. Wold of Palos Verdes who was sent there as a member of a disaster specialist team.

Following Wold's arrival in Anchorage he found that nearly 800 families had applied for Red Cross assistance and the money spent to date has been used to provide emergency food, clothing, and shelter for disaster victims.

In a report Wold said, "With the quake having lowered ground levels as much as eight feet in many areas relocation of some homes will be necessary to avoid future intrusions of tidal waters."

Red Cross expenditures in Alaska will jump drastically in the near future according to Wold, who is director of the Los Angeles Red Cross office of public information, as only about 5 cents of every disaster relief dollar is spent during the emergency period and 85 cents of that same dollar goes for the long range recovery assistance.
